### Giving Thanks

"Now Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" Hebrews 11:1

Happy November! When I reflect on the month of November Thanksgiving is always a highlight. It is a feast that we look forward to, as it is a time with family, friends and wonderful food. However, Thanksgiving is the only holiday this month, we also have All Saints Day.

I find it ironic that these two holidays, Thanksgiving and All Saints Day, appear in the same month. We begin the month by reflecting on death and all those that we have lost but end the month thanking God for everything that he has given us. How can we do either of these things? Through Faith. Faith is the great link between these holidays. For faith enables us as Christians to give thanks to God always, even in times of death and loss.

As a child I never really appreciated All Saints Day, but with each passing year it grows in meaning. Each year we lose more and more people that we long for. As the years go on the company around the Thanksgiving table changes. One year you have Grandma bustling around the kitchen, Grandpa carving the turkey while you are off playing with the cousins. Then suddenly you are the grandma and grandpa getting the meal prepared, while it is your grandkids running around the house. While you rejoice in the people who you have in the house this year, you also wish that the people you spent your first Thanksgivings with were there as well.

But this is why we have All Saints Day. It is on this day that we rejoice that God named himself *I AM* in that burning bush as he spoke to Moses. God did not say he *was* the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob but *I AM*. This is because our God is not the God of the dead, but of the God of the living. Therefore, all who die in him, in his Son's death and Resurrection, are alive in him *today*.

Therefore, we can *long* for them in faith. As we gather around the Thanksgiving Table we see in *faith* the great heavenly meal that is to come. At this meal there will be all the saints from past, present and future. On that day we will not have to worry about empty chairs, or think back on who we miss because they will be present with us again. This is why Christ died, so that we could give thanks to God together forever and ever at the heavenly table.

So this November, give thanks to God. Give thanks to what he gives to us today; our house and home, spouse and children, job, retirement, good food, whatever it is you want to give thanks for do it! But give thanks as well that because of what he has done we know that there is an even greater Thanksgiving to come. This Thanksgiving will be better than any we have had already, for it will have all the saints together praising God and delighting in the gifts he will continue to give to us forever.

## The Wonderful Impossibility of Giving Thanks

"What shall I render to the Lord for all His benefits to me? I will offer the sacrifice of thanksgiving and will call on the name of the Lord. I will take the cup of salvation, and will call on the name of the Lord. I will pay my vows to the Lord now in the presence of all His people, in the courts of the Lord's house, in the midst of you, O Jerusalem." (drawn from Ps. 116)

It was Thanksgiving Day, and my wife and I had no family in town. We were in the midst of a very busy time and didn't plan ahead for a traditional meal. In search of Thanksgiving lunch, we headed out to look for an open restaurant. The only nearby place we could find with its lights on, though, was Steak 'n Shake.

"Why not?" we thought, and sat down for a burger and fries.

I felt such immense gratitude (and a little guilt, too) toward the waitress who gave up her own Thanksgiving to take care of us that I left her a very generous tip when the meal was over. It was a small token of my deep thanks to her.

"What shall I render to the Lord for all his benefits to me?"

We sing these words from Psalm 116 in church when we return thanks to God with our gifts and tithes. The psalm calls it "a sacrifice of thanksgiving," but what does this mean? It's impossible to thank God for all his benefits. Nonetheless, as Martin Luther indicates in his explanation of the First Article of the Apostles'

Creed, we offer up thanksgiving, praise, service and obedience. These things are but a tiny token of thanks for the benefits the Lord sacrificed his Son to give to us. Here are three benefits that Psalm 116 mentions:

- 1. **His cup.** In the Garden Jesus said: "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39). It was the Father's will that Jesus drink of the cup of death. He spilled out His blood on the cross. By way of the Sacrament of the Altar his blood is given into your mouth to drink for the forgiveness of your sins. A cup of salvation, indeed! (See Psalm 116.) It's wonderfully impossible to give thanks to the Lord for this eternal benefit. But we thank, praise, serve and obey Jesus because his salvation flows over the brim into our empty cup.
- 2. His name. Psalm 116 urges us to "call on the name of the Lord." That isn't difficult to do when His name has been stamped on your forehead in Holy Baptism: "I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Wherever His name is, there He is. Now wherever you go, whatever you do, not only is His name upon you, but He is with you. Call upon His name, and He is right there to answer your prayer and to listen to your complaint. He is nearer than near to give you comfort and deliver peace. It's wonderfully impossible to give thanks to the Lord for this temporal benefit. But we thank, praise, serve and obey Jesus because He has given us his holy name.
- 3. **His people.** When we come to the Lord's house we are "in the presence of all his people..." (Psalm 116:18). There is no such thing as solo Christianity. God always puts us together with His people. In the Old Testament, He took for Himself a people when he called Israel out of Egypt and led them into the Promised Land. Jesus called together a group of twelve individuals to learn together, lean on one another and change the world with the Word of God — and then He sent them out to bring more people into the story. The benefits of being in the presence of God's people today includes "mutual conversation and consolation." God's people speak the truth in love, lend helping hands, encourage each other in the faith and pray for any and every need that arises. It's wonderfully

impossible to give thanks to the Lord for this incarnational benefit. But we thank, praise, serve and obey Jesus because he has gifted us with his people.

It's wonderfully impossible to thank the Lord fully and completely for all his benefits. But by God's grace, we thank, praise, serve and obey him. What a wonderful way to celebrate Thanksgiving every day.

Martin Luther wrote extensively about the importance and nature of giving thanks to God as a central aspect of the Christian faith. Key elements of his views on gratitude include:

- Gratitude is a spontaneous response to God's gifts, not an obligation. He argued that true thankfulness arises naturally from the recognition of God's unearned gifts (grace), rather than feeling forced to say "thank you" out of a sense of duty or law.
- "Unthankfulness is theft". Luther emphasized that a lack of gratitude means failing to acknowledge the source of all blessings, effectively "stealing" the credit from God.
- Everything is a gift from God. In his *Small Catechism*, in the explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed, Luther lists all aspects of life (body, soul, food, drink, family, etc.) as gifts from God for which we owe "thanks and praise, service and obedience".
- Thanksgiving leads to service. The result of recognizing God's gifts and feeling true gratitude is a desire to serve and obey Him, which extends to caring for others.

"Whatever happens, give thanks, because it is God's will in Christ Jesus that you do this."

1 Thessalonians 5:18 (God's Word)
